"Snow Laws"

MILLCREEK. Long-term weather forecasts don't indicate we'll be getting snow this coming week, but it looks like it's coming the week after. Now is a good time to remember a few of the laws that apply when flakes fly.

The most important of Millcreek's "SnowLaws" is that you can't park your car on the street when it's snowing or when snow is on the street. See Ord. 11.20.130. Many Millcreek streets are very narrow and just one parked car can block an entire neighborhood from our snowplows. Violation of this law can result in fines and towing.

It's not lawful to throw your ice or snow into the street where it could "interfere with the proper use of the [street] or in such a way as to obstruct travel or to endanger property or persons upon [the street]." See Ord. 14.20.105. You also can't block the gutters with snow. See Ord. 14.20.110. Instead of snowblowing into the street, please direct your blower into your yard.

Here's a SnowLaw that's designed to protect your kids as they head to school and other folks trying to walk on our city's sidewalks:

"[I]t is unlawful for the owner, occupant, lessor or agent of property abutting on a paved sidewalk to fail to remove or cause to be removed from such paved sidewalk and any existing curb ramp all hail, snow or sleet falling thereon, within **twelve hours after the hail, snow or sleet has ceased falling...**



... provided that in case of a storm between the hours of five p.m. and six a.m., the sidewalk and any existing curb ramp shall be cleaned **before eight a.m. following the storm.**" See Ord.14.32.100.

These SnowLaws are designed to help all of us get around safely after a snowfall. Let's put our good Samaritan instincts to excellent use helping our

neighbors comply. Like last winter, the city will be making an extra effort to clear sidewalks on sections of major roads, like 33rd South, where they end up covered with multiple lanes of snow from snowplows.

“Providing assistance through these existing programs is the best way to give back to your community,” Edwards continued. “These organizations have a structure in place to utilize your time, goods and money in the safest and most efficient way possible.”

For people still interested in providing their own independent food outreach, **Utah state law requires them to register their outreach event with the local health department**, at no cost, and receive food safety information. People experiencing homelessness and other individuals in need can be particularly vulnerable to foodborne illness, so it’s important that the food they receive is prepared using safe food handling practices. Many people experiencing homelessness have also already been affected by Salt Lake County’s hepatitis A outbreak, and it’s critically important that food handlers—especially those serving vulnerable populations—be vigilant and thorough in their hand washing.

At the conclusion of the citizen comment time, the Chair may direct staff to assist the citizen on the issue presented; direct the citizen to the proper administrative department(s); or take no action. This policy also applies to all public hearings. Citizens may also submit written requests (outlining their issue) for an item to be considered at a future council meeting. The Chair may place the item on the agenda under citizen comments; direct staff to assist the citizen; direct the citizen to the proper administrative departments; or take no action.
