Sidewalk grants to improve stretches of 7th E and of 39th S

MILLCREEK. This week, Millcreek was awarded grants totaling more than \$155,000 to help make walking in Millcreek more safe. [Utah's Safe Sidewalk project](#), which is administered by UDOT, has agreed to provide these funds for sidewalks on 7th East from Empire Avenue to Redmaple Road, and on the south side of 33rd South from 1885 South to 2940 East and then from Pioneer Road to 2300 East.

These three projects will be completed within the next 12 months. Hooray and many thanks to our outstanding engineering staff for procuring this funding.

September is National Preparedness Month



MILLCREEK. Ever wanted to learn first-aid, CPR, or increase your level of preparedness? Each September, the Federal Emergency Management Agency (FEMA) along with state and local Emergency Management partner agencies across the nation sponsor National Preparedness Month. This year the focus is on "planning now" for disasters.

This week we encourage community members to seek out opportunities to

learn a new life saving skill. Many of our partner organizations host classes on Stop the Bleed, CPR and AED use, basic first aid, [Until Help Arrives](#) and all prepare participants with the skills and knowledge to help someone in need.

Another course available to community members is the basic Community Emergency Response Team course (CERT). CERT traces its roots back to the Los Angeles Fire Department after responders there recognized that community members would very likely be on their own during the early stages of a catastrophic disaster. They set out and created some basic training that teaches citizens about disaster survival and rescue skills that would improve the ability of citizens to survive and to safely help others until responders or other assistance could arrive. This training model was adopted by fire departments throughout the nation and in 1994 FEMA expanded the training and standardized it for an all hazards application.

Millcreek's goal is to build a community team, armed with the knowledge and skills to help look after one another when disaster strikes. CERTs will pay an important piece to the S.A.F.E. 


Maliheh Free Clinic Opens in Millcreek

Central Wasatch Commission Invites Applications to Advisory Stakeholder Council

WASATCH MOUNTAINS. The Central Wasatch Commission (CWC) is inviting interested persons and organizations to apply to serve on its advisory Stakeholder Council. The Stakeholder Council, mandated by the CWC Interlocal Agreement, will act in an advisory capacity to the CWC board, and will include 28-35 stakeholders.

The Stakeholder Council will represent a diverse array of interests relating to the Central Wasatch Mountains, including community organizations, environmental groups, ski resorts, residents and property owners, and the general public. "The Stakeholder Council will provide a broader perspective and expertise on the issues facing the Cottonwood Canyons and Central Wasatch Mountains," said Chris McCandless, Chair, Central Wasatch Commission and Sandy City Councilman. "The Stakeholder Council will play an important role in the decisions the Commission makes."

The Stakeholder Council will function to assist the CWC board and staff in their decision making, providing expertise, opinions, and resources. The Stakeholder Council may gather information, conduct fact-finding, counsel together, provide analysis, conduct feasibility studies, and otherwise collaborate with broader constituencies with interests in the Central Wasatch Mountains in order to make suggestions, recommendations and proposals to the CWC Board and the Commission's staff.

All Council members will serve four-year terms. The CWC Board will select a Council Chair and Vice-Chair, who will serve two-year terms in their respective roles. There are not term limits for Council members.

As a condition of being appointed, Stakeholder Council members agree to support a consensus-based process for issues impacting the CWC's area, share information, and collaborate with other stakeholder council members.

Applications will be accepted through October 1st at noon. The public may view and download the application from the newly launched Central Wasatch Commission website, cwc.utah.gov.
