On January 3rd over 600 people gathered at Wasatch Jr. High to celebrate Millcreek becoming Utah's newest city and to witness the swearing in of Millcreek's first Mayor and City Council. It was a great event and involved many from our community.

Kerri Cronk of Fox 13 news was the Master of Ceremonies for the evening. The formal portion of the program was held in the school's auditorium.

A flag ceremony was conducted by members of the Unified Fire and Police with the Pledge of Allegiance lead by the Grant Stake 11-year-old Scout Patrol. The Skyline High School Madrigals and the James E. Moss Elementary Choirs both performed musical numbers.



development or redevelopment that will directly affect all areas of Millcreek. Members of the new Planning and Zoning Commission include: Dave Carlson, Scott Claerhout, Fred Healey, Shawn LaMar, Mark Mumford, Tom Stephens, and Heather Wilson. David Allen and Russell Booth will be alternate members of the Commission.

While Millcreek had a Planning and Zoning Commission long before incorporation, the new Commission will make decisions at the behest of the City, not the County. The new members were chosen from nearly 40 applicants, all residents of Millcreek, who have a wide breadth of knowledge, experience, and competence in municipal planning, architecture, zoning, real estate, and technology, to name a few.

As the City Council and Mayor interviewed each applicant, the spectrum of applicants was not only remarkable and advantageously diverse in both professional and personal backgrounds, but showed a great opportunity for leadership to guide Millcreek into this new chapter of growth.

Using the talent and knowledge of these particular Millcreek residents, the Mayor decided it would be in the City's best interest to create a steering committee of sorts. The objective of this committee will be to help identify what Millcreek's general plan will need to include as it is revamped, revised, and updated to accommodate future development. The importance of this committee rests in the fact that these are Millcreek citizens who want the best for their community and will bring unique ideas, balance, and perspective to the table.

The "Envisioning Committee" will do the legwork (along with recommendations from other specialists and advisors) to find the best solutions to areas in Millcreek that are up and coming, areas that are in flux of what once was, and of course, to make our city the united, vibrant, and desirable city that Millcreek residents want it to be.

Several months ago I drove past an open parcel of land in a long-ago established neighborhood not too far from my home here in Millcreek. As the weeks went by, I noticed that with every passing, a new phase of building had progressed into what will soon be a few beautiful new homes that will be occupied by new Millcreek residents.

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## Great Opportunities and Challenges

One of the great opportunities and challenges we have as a new city is setting up our organizational structure and city plan for action in a disaster. This is a great opportunity for us as Millcreek residents to work together on a local level to prepare for our community. The challenge comes because disaster response requires a big volunteer effort and we need Millcreek residents who are willing to step forward, and in some instances receive training, to help their neighbors in the event of an emergency.

Preparation for a disaster should take place on multiple levels: at home, in our immediate neighborhoods and city wide. A great resource to help give you ideas of where to start or grow your family plan is [www.utah.gov/beready](http://www.utah.gov/beready). This website gives suggestions for how to safely evacuate, storing food and water, how to prepare your children, what needs to be done to create an emergency plan for your pets, and much more.

In our neighborhoods, having residents with ham radio training, implementing S.A.F.E. Neighborhoods and creating a Community Emergency Response Team (CERT) will help to ensure the safety and quick response to our neighbors in need.

We have an immediate need for more ham radio operators. In the event of an emergency, amateur radio operators may be the only communication source available. You don't need to know Morse Code to use a ham radio—though some training is needed. If you are interested in learning how to operate a ham radio, or have questions on what is involved with that, please contact Millcreek resident Dave Christensen [dck2030@gmail.com](mailto:dck2030@gmail.com). Dave is organizing some training classes.

Millcreek is also looking for CERT volunteers. As we get our CERT program in place more information will be coming on training and how to get involved.

S.A.F.E. Neighborhoods is a program developed in cooperation with the Red Cross, United Fire Authority and Granite School District. S.A.F.E. stands



for School's Aiding Families in Emergencies. Local public elementary schools are designated as safe gathering places for their surrounding communities. The program trains volunteers from each school neighborhood to open, staff and operate their own community shelter until outside help arrives. The school acts only as a gathering location.

Finally, you can participate in this year's Great Utah ShakeOut on April 20, 2017. All Millcreek residents and businesses are encouraged to help Utahns prepare for a major earthquake.

At 10:15 am on April 20th, you should Drop, Cover and Hold On as if there were a major earthquake occurring at that very moment. Participants are asked to register for the ShakeOut at [www.shakeout.org/utah](http://www.shakeout.org/utah). Registration helps organizers keep track of where participants live in the Salt Lake valley and information will be emailed to keep you updated and provide information about earthquakes and preparedness.

Millcreek is a great place to live, and a great community to be a part of. Let's all work together to help Millcreek be the most prepared and ready in the event the worst ever happens.

We are all new to this, but we are confident that we will work together to creating the foundation of a great city. We want to thank you all for your trust and patience, as we navigate this together. It has been an honor for us to be elected as your city representatives. It's our job to report to you, our residents, what we are doing.

The new City Council has diligently been meeting weekly since elections to figure out what our priorities are as a new city. In the last sixty days, the Mayor and City Council have contracted the feasibility study to Lewis, Young and Robertson; selected new Planning Commissioners; started an Envision Committee for work on a general plan and ordinance review; planned an amazingly well-attended inauguration; attended training required by the Lieutenant Governor's Office; attended various meetings with community councils, UPD and Chamber East; received training on budgets, Open Meetings, GRAMA and ethics at weekly meetings; and hired our first employee, Tara Whiting, as our Office Manager. Tara lives in Millcreek, and will dedicate twenty hours to helping the Mayor and Council with constituent concerns.

As part of a new city, we are all assigned to different boards and duties. Mayor Jeff Silvestrini is our representative on the Unified Police Department Board, Salt Lake Valley Law Enforcement Area Board, Unified Fire Authority Board, Unified Fire Services Area Board, and the Metropolitan Services District Board. Councilwoman Silvia Catten is our representative on the Board of Trustees of the South Salt Lake Valley Mosquito Abatement District. Councilman Dwight Marchant is our representative on the Board of the Wasatch Front Waste and Recycling District. Councilwoman Cheri Jackson is Millcreek's Emergency Preparedness Coordinator. Councilwoman Bev Uipi has been elected by the council as Mayor Pro Tempore.

Millcreek is fortunate to have different characteristics that make-up our wonderful city,



and we anticipate we'll receive many requests, suggestions and feedback from all city residents. How do you get a hold of your City Council representative? In an effort to find alternatives for residents to engage, we will soon have an app with The Village. This app will allow residents to stream in to our meetings from home or work, and have an opportunity to give public comment.

We encourage you to attend our weekly City Council meetings on Mondays at the Mt Olympus Improvement District (3932 S. 500 E.). We are grateful to Mt Olympus Improvement District for loaning their office space to us until July. and treasure or who performed at the event to make the event a success. It was a special evening.

Millcreek was incorporated on December 28, 2016, and has made application for state road funds and sales taxes. We have enacted the same tax structure we had when we were unincorporated Millcreek township. Your City budget is funded with local option taxes, Class C road funds, fees from business licenses, building permits, and other incidental fees, as well as a franchise tax on cable television. All of these taxes, in like amounts, were previously collected by the county and will now be collected by our City. We additionally have the benefit of some start-

up funds provided by Salt Lake County and we hope to negotiate for more start-up money.

The City Council adopted a budget at its meeting on January 9, 2017. The budget is extremely preliminary because

our revenues and expenses can only be estimated at this time. However, having adopted a budget after a full public hearing and opportunity for public input, the City is now in a position to spend nominal amounts for start-up expenses.

We appreciate

the Mount Olympus Improvement District for providing us with free office space at 3932 South 500 East, Millcreek, Utah 84107, for the first six months of our existence. We also are grateful to our sister city, Cottonwood Heights, for

giving us its used furniture when it moved to new offices. Our City is now up and running. The general telephone number for Millcreek is (801) 214 2700. If I do not get back to you on the same day that you call, please understand that all of us on the City Council are extremely busy doing the things necessary to start a city from scratch. Sometimes it takes us some time to respond to constituent concerns, particularly given the number of other meetings and activities we must accomplish to serve the residents of Millcreek.
