

MILLCREEK. The City Council will be discussing firework restrictions at the council meeting on June 28th that begins at 7:00 PM. We invite everyone to [attend virtually](#) or in person to listen to the discussion. We currently expect that fireworks restrictions will be in place east of 900 East throughout the entire City, as shown in the map above. However there may be additional restrictions based on this very fluid and evolving situation.

chiefs explain [in the video below](#), restrictions will not prevent the risks fireworks pose this year. For that, we have to rely upon our friends and neighbors to act responsibly and decide to forego personal fireworks this hot, dry summer when people have cut back on their normal watering due to the drought. There are simply insufficient resources to enforce fireworks restrictions if residents are determined to light fireworks.

Many residents have questioned the 900 East boundary and requested fireworks restrictions throughout the entirety of Millcreek. We have stated publicly that if we had the legal authority to do so, we would restrict fireworks throughout the City because of the drought, the heat and the low humidity in our landscaping, buildings and other fuels this year. But state law does not allow a municipal government to make this determination without a recommendation of its Fire Marshal based upon specific criteria specified in the statute. The legislature has limited the restrictions to forests, shrubs, and grassland areas in mountains, ravines, along streams and in the urban/wildland interface. Dry lawns are not equivalent to grasslands under the statute.

The Unified Fire Authority's Fire Marshall makes recommendations for cities such as Millcreek that are within the UFA's jurisdiction. He recommended fireworks restrictions east of 1300 East within the UFA's geographical footprint. Mayor Silvestrini was able to convince him to move the line in Millcreek to 900 East by pointing out highly vegetated areas in Millcreek that lie west of 1300 East, such as the Hillview Basin area and Big Cottonwood Park.

Residents point to nearby cities that have adopted total restrictions. Holladay, also within the UFA's jurisdiction, was easily able to declare a total restriction of fireworks given the UFA Fire Marshal's recommendation, because all of

Holladay lies east of 1300 East. Cottonwood Heights, contrary to news reports, has not declared a total restriction, but has [limited its restriction to areas of the city to the east of 1300 East](#), which also complies with the UFA Fire Marshal's recommendation. Many attorneys and legislators opine that the total bans on fireworks declared by other local communities do not comply with state law. We believe that a city-wide restriction in Millcreek would leave us open to lawsuits the fireworks industry has threatened, and to other potential adverse consequences, to the detriment of Millcreek taxpayers.

Our hope is that state lawmakers will consider the extraordinary circumstances and difficult decisions faced by local leaders this year and consider giving us the power to declare an emergency when a similar situation develops in future years.

Keeping our city safe this season will require the cooperation of all of our residents. Please enjoy the holidays and celebrate without creating a potentially catastrophic situation by discharging fireworks. Come to our local pancake breakfast and 4th of July parade instead!

IF YOU CHOOSE TO DISCHARGE FIREWORKS THIS YEAR, REMEMBER:

Do not trespass on large private parking areas, such as church or business lots, to set off fireworks. This has happened all too frequently in the past. Such activity could result in a trespassing fine and thoughtless revelers often leave a mess behind for the property owner to clean up.

You are financially responsible. In addition to a fine of up to \$1,000 for discharging fireworks in a restricted area, you will be financially responsible for any damage caused, including damages caused by your underage children, along with the cost of fighting the fire.

Take care of your pets. There will be large municipal fireworks displays in several cities around the county that can cause distress to pets. If you are

Be aware of all current restrictions. Unfortunately, the printed newsletter that was delivered to your mailbox earlier this week includes information that was current at the time of printing but does not reflect new restrictions respecting the discharge of fireworks anywhere in Millcreek east of 900 East. This has been a fluid situation and circumstances changed dramatically and rapidly with the early onset of 100 degree temperatures. If you do choose to light fireworks **outside** of the restricted areas, please [click here](#) for tips and guidelines for the safe discharge of fireworks. Discharge dates and hours are set by state law and have not changed.

**Fireworks are allowed to be set-off in unrestricted areas
between the hours of 11am and 11pm
on July 2 to 5 and July 22 to 25
(July 4th and 24th hours extended to midnight)**

The UPD and the UFA have dedicated extra officers to respond to fireworks complaints during both holidays and will do their best to respond to complaints received.

Do not call 9-1-1 to report fireworks being set off in restricted areas unless you see that such have caused a fire. For illegal firework discharge reports, call the UPD non-emergency number – [801-743-7000](tel:801-743-7000) or the UFA non-emergency number - [801-840-4000](tel:801-840-4000). Please do not overwhelm 9-1-1 lines. Reports of violations will receive a response based upon the severity of the incident, the volume of calls and the availability of officers who may be responding to other, more emergent matters.

PLEASE NOTE that the July 2021 issue of the printed Millcreek News contains an outdated article regarding firework restrictions in Millcreek. Articles for our printed newsletter are written one month in advance of delivery to meet the deadlines of the printing company and mail house that we work with.

- BOUNTY PROGRAM -

The Jordan River Commission, through a recently established Jordan River Cooperative Weed Management Area, is offering a \$2 per pound “bounty” for the removal of puncturevine (*Tribulus terrestris*), also known as “goathead.” This noxious weed has sharp burs that puncture bicycle tires and hands, feet, and paws of humans and pets. This program is available to registered organizations in the State of Utah, including but not limited to, businesses, nonprofits, community and religious organizations, social clubs, and school groups, and limited to 250 yards on either side of the Jordan River. **Participants must register and be approved under the link below, before participating.**

Identification

Puncturevine grows in low-to-the-ground, dense mats about 2 to 5 feet in diameter. The stems radiate out from a central taproot. The leaves and stems have tiny hairs. The yellow flowers are about 1/2 inch wide with five petals. The seedpod is a cluster of five flat spiny burrs containing up to five seeds.

How to Remove

Puncturevine can be removed by severing the central taproot approximately one inch below the soil. Plants must be put in heavy duty trash bags to prevent future seeding and to allow for weighing. Care should be taken when bagging to not drop the thorny seedpods. If seeds fall, participants should pick up and bag the seedpods. The Jordan River Commission is available to assist with puncturevine pulls, if needed. The Commission can provide technical assistance, tools, water and snacks, and trash bags. Participants are responsible for choosing a location. The Commission is available to assist with locating puncturevine hotspots based on the preferred location.

Note: Pounds are rounded to the nearest whole number and weights must be verified by the Jordan River Commission before payment is made. Limited funds are available, and the program will be discontinued when available funds are used up or by the August 31st expiration date. Payment will be made via check.
