Groundbreaking for Phase 2 of Millcreek Common is this Week

MILLCREEK. On Tuesday, May 13th, at 10am, Mayor Jeff Silvestrini and the Millcreek City Council will officially break ground on **Phase 2 of *Millcreek Common***, the transformative public space at the heart of Millcreek's City Center. This next chapter in the city's once-in-a-generation development project promises to bring even more vibrancy, recreation, and community connection.

Phase 2 will introduce an array of new, family-friendly attractions, including a lush green space

with 135 trees, a ***Milo the Moose*** play structure, a ***Splash Creek***, a ***Skate Canyon***, a shaded gathering spot to be known as ***The Treehouse***, and a 19-hole mini-golf course.

The celebration will feature remarks from key leaders and dignitaries, including:

- **Mayor Jeff Silvestrini**, Millcreek
- **Mayor Jenny Wilson**, Salt Lake County
- **State Senator Nate Blouin**, District 13
- **Jenney Rees**, Senior Outreach Advisor for U.S. Senator John Curtis (UT)

This milestone highlights the power of collaboration. Phase 2 is being realized thanks to more than \$8 million in funding from federal, state, county, and private partners, including:

- \$2.5 million from the National Park Service
- \$2.5 million in state COVID open-space funds
- \$1.5 million from Salt Lake County's Tourism, Recreation, Culture, and Convention (TRCC) Support Program
- \$1 million from the Utah Outdoor Recreation Grant Program
- Nearly \$900,000 in city park impact fees paid by developers

At approximately 1700 hours on March 9, 2025, Millcreek and Holladay officers were dispatched to an "Assault with a Weapon" call. Initial reports from dispatch indicated that someone had sustained a self-inflicted gunshot wound at a densely populated apartment complex.

Upon arrival, officers were met with a chaotic scene both inside and outside the apartment. Many witnesses were uncooperative, and there were significant language barriers. Despite these challenges, the responding officers swiftly secured the crime scene, isolated all involved individuals, and maintained control to allow Unified Fire Authority medics to evaluate the victim.

Through a prompt and thorough investigation, it was determined that the victim's injury was not self-inflicted. The incident was subsequently reclassified as a homicide.

Thanks to the professionalism, attention to detail, and exceptional composure displayed by the UPD officers, the suspect was identified and apprehended within 24 hours. They were subsequently booked on homicide charges.

I would like to commend the following team members for their exemplary work, professionalism, and dedication to duty during this incident: Sergeants Kevin Takeno and Scott Wilberger, as well as Officers, Crystal Grady, CJ Farnes, Athena Walser, Kurtis Braley, Derian Barszcz, Alan Dowdall, Kennedy White and Jen Bithell.



MILLCREEK. Our city is participating in Building Safety Month with an eye toward assisting residents about safety in their homes and places of work. Here are some tips from the International Code Council (ICC) regarding fire and electrical safety.

Modern homes and buildings incorporate the latest building codes and are designed to minimize the possibility and effects of fire and other risks. While building safety professionals help maintain these systems, there are preventative tasks that all contribute to occupant health, occupant safety and security and overall sustainability. Here we've listed a few brief fire safety tips.

- Develop and practice a fire escape plan. Keep hallways clear of obstructions, do not block or obstruct emergency escape windows and exit doors.
 - Put a smoke alarm on every level of your home, outside each sleeping area and inside every bedroom. Test each smoke alarm regularly and keep batteries fresh by replacing them annually.
 - Never overload electrical cords or power strips, and don't use appliances that have damaged cords.
 - Make sure all pedestrian gates in the barrier fence for your pool are self-closing and self-latching. Other gates should be equipped with a locking device and should be locked.
 - Keep all items that can burn away from your home, clean leaves from your gutters and clear dead leaves and branches from shrubs and trees.

How to Spot Cyber Scams: Don't Fall for Fraudulent Emails

MILLCREEK. We've been made aware of a fraudulent email circulating that appears to come from "Millcreek Center." (This is NOT us) This false message lists your name and address, uses urgent language, and includes a link requesting payment. **Please know that this email did not come from us.** Millcreek does **not** send unsolicited payment requests via email.

Cyber scams like this are becoming more common and more convincing. To help protect yourself, here are a few key tips:

NUMBER 1 TIP: Always Check the Sender's Email Address - Scam emails often look official at first glance, but a closer look reveals they come from personal or suspicious email accounts. **Official Millcreek emails will always come from an "@millcreekut.gov" or other government-affiliated domain—not a Gmail, Yahoo, or similar personal account. As you can see above, the return email "<huddetails@prettyzesty.com>" is not from any official agency.** Always check the return email address, it is your first clue that the email is a scam or a phishing expedition,

Additional Tips to Stay Safe:

- Don't click on links in emails you weren't expecting, especially if they ask for money or personal information.
- Watch for urgency or threats. Scammers often use pressure tactics to get you to act without thinking.
- Look for spelling errors or unusual formatting, which are common in scam emails.
- When in doubt, contact us directly. Never respond to a suspicious email—call or visit our official website to verify its authenticity.

Stay alert and help spread the word to friends, neighbors, and family members—especially elderly. Awareness is the best defense against online scams.






I-80 | Lower Parleys to SR-65 (exit 134)



ROAD CONSTRUCTION NOTICE:

The Utah Department of Transportation (UDOT) will resurface I-80, from Lower Parleys Canyon to SR-65 (exit 134). The project objectives are aimed at preserving the life of the road. This paving process will not only help increase the longevity of the road but also address roadway structural integrity and enhance motorist safety by providing a smoother, more durable road surface. The on/off ramps along the route will also be resurfaced. Additional work includes variable drainage enhancements, barrier upgrades, and updated roadside signage and road surface striping.



CONSTRUCTION IMPACTS:

Early work begins Friday night, May 16 through the weekend evenings to improve drainage along EB lanes. As paving begins by June 6, lane closures will be required using barrels to guide vehicles into open lanes and safely complete the work. Motorists can expect short travel delays during peaks travel periods. We encourage planning ahead and use caution when traveling through the construction zones. Nighttime ramps closures possible. Any closures will be brief and clearly marked with proper notification well in advance of exit/entry locations.

Project Start: As early as May 16. Paving starts June 6

Days: Mon – Fri ; Weekends as necessary

Hours: Mostly nighttime; some daytime work

FOR WILDFIRES

WILDFIRE RISK REDUCTION STEPS THAT CAN MAKE YOUR HOME SAFER DURING A WILDFIRE



■ VEGETATION MANAGEMENT

1. HOME IGNITION ZONES

To increase your home's chance of surviving a wildfire, choose fire-resistant building materials and limit the amount of flammable vegetation in the three home ignition zones. The zones include the **Immediate Zone**: (0 to 5 feet around the house), the **Intermediate Zone** (5 to 30 feet), and the **Extended Zone** (30 to 100 feet).

2. LANDSCAPING AND MAINTENANCE

To reduce ember ignitions and fire spread, trim branches that overhang the home, porch, and deck and prune branches of large trees up to 6 to 10 feet (depending on their height) from the ground. Remove plants containing resins, oils, and waxes. Use crushed stone or gravel instead of flammable mulches in the **Immediate Zone** (0 to 5 feet around the house). Keep your landscape in good condition.

■ FIRE RESISTIVE CONSTRUCTION

3. ROOFING AND VENTS

Class A fire-rated roofing products, such as composite shingles, metal, concrete, and clay tiles, offer the best protection. Inspect shingles or roof tiles and replace or repair those that are loose or missing to prevent ember penetration. Box in eaves, but provide ventilation to prevent condensation and mildew. Roof and attic vents should be screened to prevent ember entry.

4. DECKS AND PORCHES

Never store flammable materials underneath decks or porches. Remove dead vegetation and debris from under decks and porches and between deck board joints.

5. SIDING AND WINDOWS

Embers can collect in small nooks and crannies and ignite combustible materials; radiant heat from flames can crack windows. Use fire-resistant siding such as brick, fiber-cement, plaster, or stucco, and use dual-pane tempered glass windows.

■ BE PREPARED

6. EMERGENCY RESPONDER ACCESS

Ensure your home and neighborhood have legible and clearly marked street names and numbers. Driveways should be at least 12 feet wide with a vertical clearance of 15 feet for emergency vehicle access.

- Develop, discuss, and practice an emergency action plan with everyone in your home. Include details for handling pets, large animals, and livestock.
- Know two ways out of your neighborhood and have a predesignated meeting place.
- Always evacuate if you feel it's unsafe to stay—don't wait to receive an emergency notification if you feel threatened from the fire.
- Conduct an annual insurance policy checkup to adjust for local building costs, codes, and new renovations.
- Create or update a home inventory to help settle claims faster.
