



# NEW TRAILHEAD AND BOAT LAUNCH ON THE JORDAN RIVER PARKWAY

A long-time vision has become a reality in Millcreek with the opening of a brand-new trailhead, complete with a scenic walking and biking loop and a boat launch along the Jordan River Parkway. Located at 1015 W. 4000 S, this new amenity offers residents and visitors a unique way to explore and enjoy the natural beauty of the western section of Millcreek.

The project has been years in the making, guided by a dream shared by the Millcreek City Council: to bring



accessible, family-friendly outdoor recreation to this part of the city. Now, that dream has taken shape as a vibrant community space that connects people to the Jordan River and to neighboring cities.

“We all hope the Jordan River will someday be more of a shining star in our community,” said Millcreek Mayor Jeff Silvestrini. “It has so much potential, and efforts like this help us reach that potential.”

The new trailhead features a loop trail perfect for walking, jogging, or biking, along with a newly installed boat ramp that opens up the river for kayaking, canoeing, and other water adventures.

“We are excited to have a boat ramp in Millcreek now!” Mayor Silvestrini added. “It makes an awesome connection to our sister cities—we hope everyone enjoys it.” *cont. on page 2: Trailhead*

### Millcreek—A Community of Compassion



Last year while visiting the Martin Luther King, Jr. Collection at the National Center for Civil and Human Rights Museum in Atlanta, I was surprised to learn that a Utah Senator helped play a pivotal role in advancing the passage of the Civil Rights Act of 1964. During a tumultuous and divided time, Utah’s Senator Frank E. Moss was among a handful of Congressmen who motioned to end the filibuster

and take the legislation to a vote.

That one fact quickly led me down a rabbit hole to finding all the long-forgotten details about that piece of legislation. But what I didn’t find has continued to impact me the most. What inspired Senator Moss to boldly move forward with what he believed was the right thing to do? And what specifically moves us to act in times of uncertainty?

Over the past year, through conflicts both mild or complicated, local or national, I’ve noticed a response from Millcreek residents that I believe sets us apart from other cities: we are driven to act by our compassion and empathy for others.

Surely there are some who are reading this that need only to remember a brief social media comment or interaction amongst community members to diminish the veracity of what I believe to be true about 65,000 Millcreek residents. # New Monument created for the Chambers Family

## Honoring Legacy: New Monument Pays Tribute to Millcreek's Early Black Farming Families

In February 2025, a powerful new monument was unveiled at the Elysian Burial Garden, commemorating the enduring legacy of Millcreek's earliest Black farming families. Erected in honor of the courageous men and women who began farming in the area as early as 1880, the memorial stands as a timeless tribute to their resilience, strength, and unwavering hope for the future.

These pioneering families—including Samuel and Amanda Chambers, and the Bankhead, James, Leggroan, and Perkins families—laid the foundation for a vibrant, hardworking community. Their determination in the face of adversity not only shaped the agricultural roots of Millcreek but also wove an unbreakable thread of perseverance through generations.

Many of these early settlers and their descendants are laid to rest in the very grounds where the monument now stands. Their stories live on—not only through names etched in stone, but also in the hearts of their descendants and the community they helped build. The memorial serves as a place for reflection, recognition, and remembrance, ensuring that their contributions will never be forgotten.

This monument can be visited at Elysian Burial Garden, 1075 E 4580 S, during operating hours.



# Hot Weather Do's & Don't to Keep Your Dog Safe

Salt Lake County Animal Services

Ensure you're the ultimate pet owner and prioritize your pup's comfort this summer! You and your furry friend deserve to stay chill and safe, steering clear of scorching cars, sizzling pavement, and sweltering balconies or patios.

**HOT CARS:** Don't underestimate the danger. Once the mercury hits 70 degrees, car interiors can soar past 116 degrees in just 10 minutes. Even on a mild 75-degree day, cracking a window or seeking shade won't save your pet from the lethal heat inside. Heatstroke, brain damage, and worse can result. If you spot a distressed pet in a vehicle—panting excessively, not responsive, drooling, or lethargic—act fast. Dial Salt Lake County Animal Service's Animal Dispatch at 801-840-4000. Avoid breaking windows yourself; instead, document the situation by taking down the license plate, taking a photo of the pet and providing details to Animal Control Officers.

**HOT PAVEMENT:** Protect those precious paws. Summer sidewalks can scorch, causing painful burns. Before stepping

out, test the pavement with the back of your hand. If you can't endure the heat for five seconds, it's too hot for your pup. Plan to walk your dog during cooler morning or evening hours and skip outings to crowded events like festivals or markets.

**HOT BALCONIES:** Even shaded balconies can become danger zones. High temperatures can quickly make them unbearable for pets left unattended. Anx-

ious and dehydrated, they may attempt risky escapes. If you witness a distressed pet on a balcony, reach out to Animal Control at 801-840-4000 immediately.

# A Hero's Legacy: Steven Johnson's Journey from Saigon to Millcreek


The 50th anniversary of, "The Fall of Saigon," was on April 30, 2025. Steven Johnson, a resident of Millcreek, served as a U.S. Marine and was part of the Ambassador's Personal Protective Security Unit during the final evacuation of the United States Embassy in Saigon. This is his remarkable story.

"You had to make the best of a bad situation," Johnson said. "I had the best times of my life over there and the worst times of my life



over there, and sometimes they were just minutes apart."

Johnson, who enlisted in the Marine Corps shortly after graduating high school, would go on to play a crucial role in the dramatic evacuation of American personnel and Vietnamese allies from South Vietnam as Saigon fell to Communist forces. At 22 years old and completing rigorous Personal Protective Security testing and training, he served as the bodyguard to Ambassador Graham Martin. Johnson was



tasked with keeping the Ambassador and other diplomats safe in the midst of chaos. His efforts on the ground would later be recognized with numerous awards including the Navy Achievement Medal for his heroic actions during this pivotal moment in history.

"It was a time of intense pressure, but I did what they told me to do," Johnson recalls. "The mission was clear: get everyone out safely." Johnson's superiors have praised his ability to perform under the most stressful circumstances, with many reporting that he helped rescue many people just before the final evacuation. As enemy forces closed in, Johnson was instrumental in guiding individuals to helicopters, barges, and ships waiting offshore to carry them to safety.

The final hours of the U.S. Embassy in Saigon saw the enemy getting closer and closer, with an assassin attempting to take the Ambassador's life disguised as a civilian. Despite the threat, Johnson remained steadfast, ensuring that the Ambassador and the others under his protection were safely evacuated. His actions that day helped save countless lives.

After the fall of Saigon, Johnson's military career took him around the world, including a remarkable assignment to the U.S. Embassy in Beirut, where he met his wife, Amal. The couple eventually settled in Millcreek, where they have made a life for themselves, raising a family while never forgetting the sacrifices and experiences that shaped their lives.

Reflecting on his service, Johnson is humble. "I was just doing my job," he says. "The hardest part is that those of us who survived still think about this every single day."



Johnson made lifelong friendships and affectionately calls them his "therapists." He attends as many events as he can and just traveled to San Diego for the 50th Anniversary Reunion.

"I feel I have an obligation to all those that were killed or are now trying to manage the demons war causes, to keep the memory alive as long as I can. There is a lesson about life and what you make of it. I received a plaque when I left Vietnam that reads, 'You have never lived until you have almost died, and those who fight for it, life has a flavor that the protected will never know.'"

There's something about summer that makes ice cream taste like happiness—and lucky for us, Millcreek has more than its fair scoop. I consider myself a certified ice cream connoisseur (self-appointed but passionately earned). With summer heating up, I'm on a mission to help you cool down with the best frozen treats our sweet city has to offer. Grab a spoon (or a cone), because our city is stacked with delicious options for an Ice Cream Crawl!

Let's start with a fun fact: did you know ice cream has been around since ancient China? Way back, they mixed snow with fruit and honey—basically the original sorbet. By the 1700s, ice cream made its way to America, and by the 1800s, it was being sold from pushcarts in New York City. The first ice cream served in Utah can be traced back to 1888 with the establishment of the Aggie Creamery at what is now Utah State University in Logan. Both Snelgrove Ice Cream in Salt Lake City and Farr's Ice Cream in Ogden began delighting Utahns in 1929. Fast-forward to today, and you can find gourmet scoops and wild flavors right here in our own neighborhood.

First stop: Blacksmith Ice Cream Co. The newest to Millcreek. This place is hip, small-batch, and always surprises me. Their flavors rotate, so one day you'll get lavender honeycomb and the next, something like brown butter snickerdoodle. They are also allergy-conscious, and some flavors offer oat milk ice cream along with options that are free from lactose, gluten, nuts, soy, artificial dyes, and corn syrup.

Handel's is a classic—creamy, rich, and the kind of ice cream that tastes like your childhood. Milton and I splurge on the 4 Scoop Sampler because it's the best bang for your buck and we can try new flavors every time—there are so many!

Now, if you're out and about and spot the Normal Ice Cream truck at Millcreek Common, run—don't walk! It's soft serve, but elevated. Think vanilla bean with a honeycomb dip or swirled with seasonal jams. It's the kind of treat you post on Instagram and then immediately devour.

For the custard crowd, Nielsen's Frozen Custard is a Utah institution. It's denser than ice cream, smoother than soft serve, and comes in glorious concoctions called "concretes." It's like dessert and therapy in one cup.

And last, but definitely not least, Iceberg Drive Inn has been a beloved Millcreek fixture for over 6 decades. They are renowned for their thick, indulgent milkshakes, often described as more akin to a custard than a traditional milkshake. Flavors range from classic vanilla to inventive options like Grasshopper and Boysenberry.

Millcreek may be known for its canyons and cozy neighborhoods, but I say it's the coolest town in Utah—literally and deliciously. However you like your cold cream, there's a sweet treat waiting for you just around the corner.

So go out, try something new, and treat yourself this summer. You deserve it. I'll be the one two steps ahead of you in line, probably getting a double scoop.



## OFFICERS OF THE MONTH

At approximately 1700 hours on March 9, 2025, Millcreek and Holladay officers were dispatched to an "Assault with a Weapon" call. Initial reports from dispatch indicated that someone had sustained a self-inflicted gunshot wound at a densely populated apartment complex.

Upon arrival, officers were met with a chaotic scene both inside and outside the apartment. Many witnesses were uncooperative, and there were significant language barriers. Despite these challenges, the responding officers swiftly secured the crime scene, isolated all involved individuals, and



maintained control to allow Unified Fire Authority medics to evaluate the victim.

Through a prompt and thorough investigation, it was determined that the victim's injury was not self-inflicted. The incident was subsequently reclassified as a homicide.

Thanks to the professionalism, attention to detail, and exceptional composure displayed by the UPD officers, the suspect was identified and appre-

hended within 24 hours. They were subsequently booked on homicide charges.



## The History of Olympus Hills Shopping Center



Opened in 1967, Olympus Hills Shopping Center quickly became a cornerstone of the Olympus Cove and Canyon Rim area. Designed with a forward-thinking approach, it featured wide parking lots, retail shops, and a focus on convenience, catering to the growing suburban population. It was one of the first centers in the region to offer a comprehensive shopping experience, blending retail, dining, and entertainment.

A standout feature from the start was Olympus Hills Lanes, a popular bowling alley that quickly became a community hub. Offering family-friendly fun and league bowl-

ing, it played a key role in the social life of Millcreek residents, making the center a destination for both shopping and recreation to this day. This blend of retail and entertainment was ahead of its time, creating a space for all ages to gather.

As Millcreek continued to grow, the shopping center adapted, maintaining its original charm and appeal. Its mix

of locally owned shops, restaurants, and services has kept it bustling for decades. Olympus Hills has become more than just a place to shop—it's become a focal point for community life.






# It's Orange Cone Season In Millcreek



Roadwork and infrastructure projects can cause temporary inconveniences, but these efforts are essential for keeping our city safe, functional, and prepared for the future. Here's what's happening as part of our capital improvement, stormwater infrastructure, and pavement preservation initiatives

### STORMWATER PIPELINE PROJECTS: ADDRESSING FLOODING CONCERNS



To tackle community flooding issues, we are installing two new storm drain systems in the city. The first installation will be

on Siggard Avenue, extending toward 1720 East and Orchard Drive. The second will be situated on Astro Way, heading toward Gilroy Road. These projects aim to manage excess rainfall and reduce water accumulation on roadways, thereby protecting homes from flooding. The initiatives will include the installation of drainage inlets, piping, and other necessary infrastructure to enhance neighborhood safety and prevent flood damage.

These are two of our major projects for the season with our stormwater utility fee budget. We have more projects to come as part of our ongoing commitment to improving community resilience against flooding.

### WASATCH BOULEVARD MULTI-USE PATH: CREATING A SAFER AND MORE CONNECTED COMMUNITY

Construction will begin on the west side of Wasatch Boulevard, between 4500 South and 3680 South. This project will create a multi-use path that provides an important regional trail connection and improves safety for pedestrians and cyclists. The multi-use path will be approximately 10 feet wide, including upgraded pedestrian ramps, shorter crossing distances at minor intersections, and landscaping features. Additionally, bike lanes will be marked south of 4500 South, extending to the border with Holladay City.

### NEFFS CANYON EMERGENCY OPERATIONS PROJECT: PHASE ONE

In coordination with the U.S. Forest



Service (USFS), we are launching the first phase of our multi-phase initiative to improve emergency operations and public safety at the Neffs Canyon trailhead. This phase will begin with a complete reconstruction of the deteriorating parking lot, which includes removing the old asphalt and repaving the area. We will also designate specific parking stalls to accommodate better all users, including ADA patrons and emergency vehicles. This project marks the first step toward establishing a foundation for future enhancements to improve emergency response capabilities and create a safer, more accessible, and more functional space for public and emergency use in our canyons.

### PAVEMENT PRESERVATION WORK IN PROGRESS

To extend the lifespan of our roads and reduce the need for major repairs in the future, we will be carrying out pavement preservation projects in several neighborhoods this summer. Here's a quick over-



view of the treatments being used:

- Slurry Seal: A protective coating that seals cracks and refreshes the surface.
- Micropaving: A more durable option that helps prevent cracking and potholes.
- Overlay: A thicker asphalt layer is applied to restore smoother driving conditions and extend pavement life.

We plan to work in the following areas this season:

- Atkin Avenue & Vimont Avenue
- 2300 East; 3300 South Roundabout Area
- 3900 South; 700 East to Highland Drive
- Marvia Drive Neighborhood
- Spring View Drive & 800 East Neighborhood

cont. from page 1: Council Corner in our community, or maybe better yet, humanity.

In 2020 after a violent windstorm tore through Millcreek, residents were left with yard debris from fallen trees and branches. The storm was strong enough to declare a city emergency and provoke a community-wide cleanup. Dozens of volunteers showed up on a Saturday with their own vehicles, trailers, and tools to remove debris from dozens of properties around the city. I recall several residents that day who told me they would have never been able to do the work alone, and expressed gratitude (often through tears) that strangers would just show up to help.

More than a feeling, compassion is a force. In 2023 when the owners of the Holladay Hills apartments announced they would be displacing 130 households from the affordable housing complex, our Promise Program did not hesitate to act. The situation affected families and individuals, most with low-income needs and limited resources, to find comparable and

accommodating housing with very short notice. Millcreek Promise, with help from United Way, the local church congregation, and other organizations like the Renters Justice Coalition, organized volunteers to canvass the complex and reached every single household. This was truly remarkable considering the many language barriers, complicated individual needs, and getting people moved—all within 30 days. Of the many times our staff and residents have helped coordinate over the years, this to me stands out as one of the most compassionate acts of service I've ever seen.

I think it's worth mentioning that I've received more notes of compassion from residents than I ever expected. I am regularly contacted for any number of reasons, many of which come as a response to a particularly contentious community issue. One issue that stands out above the rest is Millcreek's willingness to host a winter overflow shelter for unhoused individuals—not once, but twice, in the last five years. Both times, most emails I've received from residents offered

support, expressed interest in service opportunities, and showed immense compassion to help this vulnerable population.

In the same vein, Millcreek residents showed support and compassion earlier this year for immigrant and refugee families who received a letter asking them to leave the country or face deportation even though they were here legally. After Mayor Silvestrini publicly denounced these actions for the lack of due process, Millcreek residents helped raise funds to be used for legal services for the families.

At a time when division seems likely, and difference in opinion often outweighs civility, we can choose how we treat each other. When we care for each other, especially in uncertainty, we act accordingly. Maybe Millcreek is not an outlier for compassionate residents, but some evidence might suggest otherwise.
