MILLCREEK. Millcreek is excited to announce the opening of a winter season climbing experience. It's no surprise that the climbing wall at Millcreek City Hall doesn't get much use in cold weather. Until now! We have worked with [The Scratch Pad](#), a dry tooling gym in Bountiful, to create the world's tallest dry tooling wall!

We're hosting three FREE dry tooling demo days on January 17, February 16 & March 14. This is a perfect opportunity for people to learn more about this unique sport.

Dry tooling began as a way to practice ice climbing without ice. It is still used for that purpose, but has also become a popular activity in and of itself for the climbing community. This is a fun sport for anyone to try. Novice and expert climbers are welcome; no experience necessary. Read more about dry tooling in our interview with Alex Rudow in the February print newsletter. They'll be hitting mailboxes next week and you can also pick up a copy at city hall.

Mayor Jackson Selected by Peers for Key Posts

At the first Salt Lake County Council of Governments (COG) meeting of the new year, city and county leaders from around the valley asked Millcreek Mayor Cheri Jackson to serve as the organization's secretary. The unanimous vote

puts her in line to be next year's vice chair and then chair of the powerful organization.

Mayor Jackson was also elected by her peers to the county Tourism, Recreation, Culture, and Convention (TRCC) Committee. This important group distributes Salt Lake County's hotel taxes. Millcreek Common Phase II, for example, received a \$1 million grant from this committee last year.

Millcreek's new mayor was also recruited to Wasatch Front Regional Council's influential Regional Growth Committee (RGC). This position serves as the policy advisory body to the region regarding long-range transportation planning, land use, and other growth-related issues.

"I'm honored as a new mayor to be selected to serve in these regional leadership positions," said Mayor Jackson. "Growth and grants are both areas where I am grateful that Millcreek has a seat at the table," she said.

PUBLIC HEARING RE: REQUEST TO OPERATE MINING FACILITY IN PARLEY'S CANYON

Important DAQ Public Hearing

MILLCREEK. The Division of Air Quality (DAQ) will be holding a public hearing regarding the Granite Construction Company's request to operate an aggregate mining facility at it's I-80 South Quarry in Parley's Canyon.

This is a last minute opportunity for residents to make their comments regarding this proposal. Public comments will be considered in making the final decision on the approval/disapproval of the proposed project. The public comment period ends on January 30th, so attend if possible. If you are unable to attend, comments may be emailed to jpersons@utah.gov or mailed to the Utah Division of Air Quality, 195 N 1950 W, Salt Lake City, UT 84116. Written correspondence regarding the project should include the engineer's name, John Persons, as well as the DAQE number: DAQE-IN161200002-25.

The following wording is the DAQ notice that will appear in the newspaper:

"The Granite Construction Company (GCC) has requested to operate an aggregate mining facility at its I-80 South Quarry in Salt Lake County. The facility will consist of aggregate mining, crushing, and screening operations. GCC will operate crushers, diesel generators, conveyors, a feeder, and a screen at this location. The facility will be a new minor source of PM, NOx, CO,

SO₂, VOCs, and HAPs. It will be located in an area designated as maintenance for PM_{2.5}, as well as nonattainment for ozone and SO₂.

The Director published the Intent to Issue an Approval Order for this project on December 17, 2025, initiating a 30-day public comment period. Within 15 days of the start of the public comment period, a request was submitted to extend the comment period. In accordance with UAC R307-401-7, the public comment period will be extended by an additional 15 days. Therefore, the public comment period will end on January 31, 2026.

Additionally, the Division of Air Quality will hold a public hearing for this project. The public hearing will be held from 5:00 p.m. to 7:00 p.m. on Wednesday, January 28, 2026 at Millcreek City Hall, located at 1330 East Chambers Ave., Millcreek, UT 84106. The hearing will take place in the Grandview Room on the sixth floor."

Legal Liability Risk Leads City Council to Formally Decouple Community Councils from City Code

MILLCREEK. On Monday, the Millcreek City Council voted to repeal portions of the Millcreek Code that had created a formal relationship between the city and four long-standing community councils. This decision does **not** eliminate community councils. Instead, it reduces legal risk for the city while giving the councils greater independence and flexibility moving forward.

Why the Change?

Under Millcreek's code, community councils were required to hold elections, conduct meetings open to the public, and make formal recommendations on planning and zoning matters. According to the Utah Property Rights Ombudsman—a state public official—those requirements effectively made the councils “public bodies” under state law.

That distinction matters. Public bodies are subject to the Utah Open and Public Meetings Act, strict record-keeping requirements, and public records requests. Millcreek's legal counsel agreed that if community councils remained formally tied to the city, they would be required to comply with a wide range of state laws and standards that they are not currently meeting.

One example is elections. If considered public bodies, community councils would be required to follow state election law, including provisions for absentee, military, and overseas ballots, ADA compliance, voter identification, and ballot access rules. Meeting those requirements would be costly and would require significant staff time and taxpayer resources.

After reviewing the legal guidance, the City Council concluded that bringing community councils into full compliance as public bodies would be impractical and expensive. Repealing the ordinances that formalized the relationship reduces the city's legal liability while allowing community councils to continue operating independently.

It's also worth noting that no other city in Utah has a community council system as formal as Millcreek's, and there is good reason why cities rely on a single planning commission to handle planning and zoning matters.

What Is the Purpose of the Community Councils?

The Millcreek Community Council, East Millcreek Community Council, Canyon Rim Citizens Association, and Mount Olympus Community Council all have long and respected histories of advocating for their neighborhoods and for Millcreek as a whole.

In recent years, community councils have functioned somewhat like "mini planning commissions," offering formal recommendations to the city's Planning Commission. But their role has always been broader than land-use issues.

Historically, community councils have helped develop parks, sponsored neighborhood programs and events, and advocated for residents on a wide range of issues—including Millcreek's incorporation. They are independent organizations with their own bylaws and budgets. Until Monday's vote, they were unique among community groups in having a formal, codified role in advising the city on planning and zoning matters. Other organizations, of course, have always been free to provide input informally.

Will the Community Councils Go Away?

City leaders hope not.

Community councils existed long before a county ordinance formalized their

relationship with the city, and the City Council expressed a clear desire for them to continue their important advocacy work. Decoupling the councils from city government gives them more freedom to determine their own membership, meeting structure, and operations. They are no longer subject to election requirements or required city trainings.

City staff will continue to support community councils in practical ways. Their meetings and events will still be shared through city newsletters—both print and digital—and posted on the city website. Links to community council websites and social media pages will remain available on the city’s site. Community councils are still welcome to meet at the Adventure Hub at Millcreek Common, and they may apply for help to fund administrative costs or community events.

At the same time, city staff are developing new engagement tools. As a pilot project, open houses will be held two weeks before each Planning Commission meeting. These open houses will allow residents and business owners to meet with planning staff and applicants, ask questions, and share concerns. Dates and times will be included on required mailed and posted notices. Anyone may attend—including members of community councils—and written comments submitted at these meetings will become part of the public record.


Community councils may also continue to discuss applications after attending these open houses and hearing from neighbors, and provide feedback to the Planning Commission and City Council.

Can Community Councils Still Make Recommendations?

Yes.

Any organization may provide recommendations on planning and zoning applications or budget items, and the city hopes community councils will continue to do so. While the formal relationship has changed, the value of informed, thoughtful community input has not.

Community councils remain an important voice in Millcreek—and the city looks forward to their continued involvement in shaping its future.



20th East Construction Kickoff

MILLCREEK. We're kicking off the construction season early this year with the start of Phase 2 of the 2000 East Safety and Improvement project on Monday, January 19. Set between 3300 South and Atkin Avenue, this phase follows the completion of Phase 1 in the fall of 2024 and brings similar infrastructure

enhancements to our community.

The project aims to promote active transportation and ensure pedestrian safety by transforming the west side of 2000 East. The infrastructure improvements reflect our commitment to long-lasting benefits for residents. Among the initiatives are piping the west-side irrigation ditch, installing pedestrian-friendly sidewalks, and creating a new bike lane. Additionally, roadway resurfacing will help extend the road's lifespan.

Construction brings its fair share of challenges that everyone is familiar with. Residents living along the corridor can expect our Public Involvement team to notify them of any anticipated impacts throughout the project. Residents can expect:

- Construction activities during daytime hours from 7 a.m. to 5 p.m., with advance notice for any work after 5 p.m.
- Increased noise, dust, and vibration
- Temporary traffic configuration changes, with traffic shifts and one-way traffic
- Staging of construction equipment, materials, and traffic control devices.

We expect construction to take place through the end of the year, and we appreciate everyone's patience and cooperation during these activities.

TAKE CARE OF YOUR PARKS



Digging in a City Park is a Class B Misdemeanor

MILLCREEK. We have been alerted that there has been some digging in Canyon Rim Park with the idea of creating bike jumps. Although this may sound like fun to some, it is not the purpose of this park and is illegal. We were alerted that this damage was being caused by not only some older boys but an adult.

There have also been reports of electric motorcycles racing in the park, on the trails and on the grass. This activity is dangerous to park users, causes damage, and is also not allowed.

According to city ordinance 13.04.270, Defacing Or Destruction Of Property, disturbing turf is a class B misdemeanor, requiring an appearance before a judge and potential fines. Aside from this potential criminal record, which we are certain nobody wants, the damage to the park should not happen. We all

value our parks, and Canyon Rim Park is a gem where residents and visitors alike can enjoy a beautiful park space in ways for which it was intended. Let's work to keep it that way.


