MILLCREEK. The Millcreek Youth Council attended the Utah League of Cities and Towns (ULCT) Local Officials Day at the Capitol this week. Youth leaders from Millcreek went to the capitol to learn about how the legislative process works. They had the opportunity to tour the capitol to see the beautiful architecture and learn the process of our 45-day legislative session. One

highlight for them was seeing the "Gold Room," which is a room used for public-facing bill signings by Governor Spencer Cox.

They also had the chance to engage in mock debates where local youth leaders from other cities debated the benefits of using public dollars on recreation centers in rural communities and solutions to the affordable housing crisis in Utah. They were able to talk with local city leaders and state legislators during lunch to share what issues matter to them most. The day culminated in a speech from Governor Spencer Cox who talked about the importance of affordable housing and the topic of cell phones in schools. The students left energized thinking about these issues and appreciative of knowing how these processes work in their state. Some of them even had questions about potential future internships in the legislature.

This group of youth represented Millcreek well. Our city and state are in good hands with these young people as our future leaders!

PUBLIC HEARING RE: REQUEST TO OPERATE MINING FACILITY IN PARLEYS CANYON

Important DAQ Public Hearing

MILLCREEK. The Division of Air Quality (DAQ) will be holding a public hearing regarding the Granite Construction Company's request to operate an aggregate

mining facility at its I-80 South Quarry in Parley's Canyon.

This is a last minute opportunity for residents to make their comments regarding this proposal. Public comments will be considered in making the final decision on the approval/disapproval of the proposed project. The public comment period ends on January 30th, so attend if possible. If you are unable to attend, comments may be emailed to jpgersons@utah.gov or mailed to the Utah Division of Air Quality, 195 N 1950 W, Salt Lake City, UT 84116. Written correspondence regarding the project should include the engineer's name, John Persons, as well as the DAQE number: DAQE□IN161200002-25.

The following wording is the DAQ notice that will appear in the newspaper:

"The Granite Construction Company (GCC) has requested to operate an aggregate mining facility at its I-80 South Quarry in Salt Lake County. The facility will consist of aggregate mining, crushing, and screening operations. GCC will operate crushers, diesel generators, conveyors, a feeder, and a screen at this location. The facility will be a new minor source of PM, NOx, CO, SO2, VOCs, and HAPs. It will be located in an area designated as maintenance for PM2.5, as well as nonattainment for ozone and SO2.

The Director published the Intent to Issue an Approval Order for this project on December 17, 2025, initiating a 30-day public comment period. Within 15 days of the start of the public comment period, a request was submitted to extend the comment period. In accordance with UAC R307-401-7, the public comment period will be extended by an additional 15 days. Therefore, the public comment period will end on January 31, 2026.

Additionally, the Division of Air Quality will hold a public hearing for this project. The public hearing will be held from 5:00 p.m. to 7:00 p.m. on Wednesday, January 28, 2026 at Millcreek City Hall, located at 1330 East Chambers Ave., Millcreek, UT 84106. The hearing will take place in the Grandview Room on the sixth floor."

What's new: the City is piloting **open houses two weeks before each Planning Commission meeting**, where you can meet applicants and planning staff and submit comments for the public record. Community Councils will attend, listen, and share consolidated feedback on behalf of neighbors.
