

### **Message from the Mayor: Millcreek's "Clear View Ordinance"**

OPEN MESSAGE TO THE RESIDENTS OF

Our "Clear View" Ordinance ([11.08.230\(A\) Millcreek Code of Ordinances](#)) was something we inherited from the County. It's nothing new, although the Millcreek Council did clarify the ordinance as originally written to make it more understandable and compliant with [national safety standards](#).

This ordinance is not unique to Millcreek or Salt Lake County. Almost all municipalities have one. It requires that corner properties at intersections keep vegetation trimmed to a level so all users can have a "clear view" of the intersection. This is important for obvious safety reasons, particularly where children are riding bikes or people are walking facing oncoming traffic.

Most of the city's enforcement action has been in response to complaints from neighbors who object to the overgrown vegetation, indicating they can't see signs, or oncoming traffic, including pedestrians and bicyclists. The city has also initiated enforcement action respecting other properties in violation in the same vicinity in order to try to be even-handed and uniform. I know people get used to these situations and some owners like the privacy such vegetation can create. However, others complain, even to the extent of having Mr. Gephart of Channel 2 TV intervene when they think the city has not been diligent in enforcing its code. The situation was one where the city bent over backwards to accommodate the offending property owner, who ultimately engaged a lawyer in an effort to avoid trimming her hedge to ordinance standards.

Millcreek always provides a courtesy notice of a violation and an adequate

opportunity to cure the issue before more drastic action is taken. Our notices provide a contact at the city and invite residents to call if they need more time, wish to get clarification or want to appeal. We have worked with people and given extensions, often to the frustration of the complainants who think we are not moving fast enough.

Enforcement of this ordinance is not a new thing, nor is it our top priority. However, code enforcement is part of our job. Our codes exist for good reasons. They protect property values of neighbors and neighborhoods and they promote safety. Children riding bikes at risk of being hit by cars for lack of clear view intersections is NOT part of the charm of Millcreek.

I understand that no one likes to be told what to do and that some folks have more difficulty complying due to age or limited resources. We try to work with them. We have even solicited volunteers to help in some instances. Please be kind to our code enforcement officers. They are not trying to be draconian; they are trying to do their jobs to keep Millcreek neighborhoods safe.

## FIREWORKS SEASON IS UPON US

MILLCREEK. The Unified Fire Authority (UFA) has released an updated map of firework restrictions in Millcreek for 2019. The orange areas indicate areas in which fireworks are illegal due to a variety of reasons including proximity to flammable forests and trails.

We ask all residents of Millcreek to carefully look over the UFA's interactive map, which can be found [by clicking here](#) or the button below, and to use fireworks responsibly and safely. As everybody does their part, we will all be able to enjoy a safe and fun summer, fireworks and all.

Aside from not discharging fireworks in restricted areas, be aware of the law, and follow all the rules as outlined below by the Unified Fire Authority.

- Sales of legal fireworks allowed:
  - Beginning on June 24th and ending on July 25th
- Discharge Dates:
  - Day before, day of, and two (2) days after July 4th and 24th
- Hours of Discharge:
  - 11am-11pm
  - July 4th and 24th - discharge allowed until midnight (12am)
- Penalties:

- Persons guilty of an infraction if:
  - Discharge of fireworks outside of legal dates
  - Discharge of fireworks in an area where fireworks are prohibited
  - **UP TO \$1,000 FINE**

Don't forget your furry family members during fireworks season. Pets tend to be frightened by fireworks, so be sure to leave your pet at home when you head out to a fireworks display, check that your pet is wearing their ID tag, and keep windows and doors closed (not just screens).

If you find a lost pet, contact Animal Control Dispatch at 801-743-7000 to have an officer come get the animal or bring it to Salt Lake County Animal Service at 511 W 3900 S. Shelter hours are Monday-Saturday from 10am-6pm. Animal Services is closed Sundays and will be closed July 4th and 24th.






